A Message from Pastor Gross....

A Complete Home Makeover

Now after six days Jesus took Peter, James, and John, and led them up on a high mountain apart by themselves; and He was transfigured before them. His clothes became shining, exceedingly white, like snow, such as no launderer on earth can whiten them.

- St. Mark, the Ninth Chapter, NKJV

I don't know if you are one of those devotees to home-makeover shows or not. Basic idea is that home owners find something wrong with a house either in which they live or just bought for resale, to 'flip' it. They tear out walls, dig up the yard, rip out fixtures, all so that they can live in, or sell, a 'perfect' house. Other shows take someone who's just won some lottery money or come into a generous inheritance, and leads them around neighborhoods looking to trade up into a 'dream' home where they'll live happily ever after, at least until the tax and utility bills start rolling in. Not sure how many of the new owners of 'perfect homes' end up looking for a 'tiny house' a year or two later.

But these dramatic transformations of living conditions are nothing compared to Christ's on the Day of Transfiguration. So totally other did Jesus appear that day that He utterly terrified His students. Obviously the miracles He'd performed hadn't put a dent in these Disciples' understanding of Who Jesus really was. Even if they had not listened to the Virgin Mary talk about all what happened the Day of Jesus' Birth, the shepherds' visit, the Magi, His exceptional youth, just watching Jesus' miracles should have given them a clue. Still, as one not wanting to judge, I'll cut them some slack since I myself need the Holy Spirit, given as a free gift since Pentecost, to realize in part Who Jesus really is.

Jesus' shocking transformation and 'upgrade' into a perfect human habitation is a makeover for the Ages. Not only was His sinless human body transfigured from humbleness into glory, but the very essence of glory He alone shared with His Father in eternity before Creation existed suddenly burst through His humanity into the full terrifying glory God shielded Moses from on Mt. Horeb. Suddenly Peter, James, and John saw Christ's true form: His essential human nature no longer shielding His friends from His essential, glorious Divine nature.

When Moses descended Mt. Horeb, we're told "Moses put a veil over his face so that the children of Israel could not look steadily at the end of what was passing away. But their minds were blinded. For until this day the same veil remains unlifted in the reading of the Old Testament, because the veil is taken away in Christ. But even to this day, when Moses is read, a veil lies on their heart. Nevertheless when one turns to the Lord, the veil is taken away."

The terrified Israelites, overcome by God's glory just reflected in Moses' face, asked God never to appear like that again. As spectacular as God's appearance atop Mt. Horeb was, the LORD also intended to show forth even more glory in the Age of Christ. While a veil upon Moses' face could conceal some of God's Glory, during this Era of history His Glory in Christ would be greater.

Can we, as humble sinners, bear seeing God's Glory any more than Moses, Peter, James, or John? Moses quaked with terror, the Letter to the Hebrews tells us. Peter, James, and John fell down terrified, trembling with fear, when they saw Who Jesus really is: Glorious Jehovah in the flesh. When we stand before Christ for judgement, how can we not be reduced to quivering bowls of jelly when facing the terror of God' Glory??

Well, fortunately for us, the LORD of Glory has a plan to take away the fearful beholding of His raw majesty and power. We too are in the process of having a glorious home makeover, performed by the Master Builder of the Universe, Who first hovered over the face of the waters of the great deep when Christ declared, "Let there be Light!" Now in the Age of the Messiah, when the Holy Spirit is poured out upon is in grace and mercy, we can look at God's glory without fear: "We all, with unveiled face, beholding as in a mirror the glory of the Lord, are being transformed into the same image from glory to glory, just as by the Spirit of the Lord." — 2 Corinthians 3:18

The Holy Spirit leads us to repentance, to turn away from the world, and turn to Christ the LORD in Faith. When we turn to Christ, the veil of unbelief, the veil of fear is removed. When we see Christ by Grace through Faith, we understand the Old Testament Scriptures, that all things of the Law and Prophets are about Christ.

When we behold Him in the New Testament, we see not the LORD come in wrath, but the LORD born of a Virgin, Who took human flesh upon Himself, come to suffer, live, and die with us and for us. Then His true glory is revealed to us who are being transformed into the image of Christ by the Spirit of our Lord Jesus. By the primordial waters God created heaven and earth. By the Baptismal waters, we are recreated, from our humble mortal houses of clay, into the image of God's Son, crucified and resurrected, also one day destined by His power & promise to share His glory. For as we have born the image of mortal Adam, the man of dust, so also we shall bear the image of immortal Christ, sharing with Him in His power and glory.

So, the Holy Spirit continues His makeover on us. In our Father's eyes we are already perfect and glorious through His gift of faith in Christ His perfect Son. At the Last Day we shall be fully transformed to share Christ's glory, as the Moon was created to reflect the glory of the Sun. As He continues His work in your life, may you eagerly look forward to what you shall be when we are revealed to be like Him our glorious Savior, even Jesus Christ, our Lord. Greetings from Pastor Gross

DRAFT Zion Lutheran Church – Voter's Assembly Minutes DRAFT January 14, 2024

Gary Klekamp called the meeting to order at 9:50 am and opened the meeting with a prayer.

Attendance: 13 members present. Quorum was established.

Minutes: Minutes from the October 26, 2023 meeting submitted and reviewed. Motion by Sue Matzat and seconded by Frank Wallace to approve minutes, MCVV.

Treasurer's Report: Stacy Stremsterfer presented a report showing full year expenses with budgeted numbers along with bank account balances as of 12/31/23. A few line items went over budget due to issues beyond our control which were reviewed. The report does not show the \$5,000 loan taken from the building fund. Usually January is also the time money collected for building funds from 2023 is transferred, however that will be placed on hold for now. With those numbers included it's a total of a little under \$10,000 that is on loan. Motion by Brad Mahler and seconded by Bill LaMarca to accept Treasurer's Report, MCVV.

Financial Secretary Report: Eric Oschwald presented his report that was prepared January through December. Year to date we are slightly behind in General and Mission categories. Missions are behind due to the 90/10 rule that was suspended until the church's finances are in better condition. The Building line item is solely based on what is marked on the offering envelopes, Oschwald fund is down from previous years and there have been several memorials. Nathan VanZele will be taking over as Financial Secretary and has been receiving training over the past month. Things seem to be going well. Report was accepted by unanimous consent.

Elder's Report: Brad Mahler reported they have been helping Pastor with his duties as needed. First year confirmation has 2 students and will also be teaching the Adult bible class after church. There were 14 to 18 surveys that were returned on the congregation's priorities concerning incoming Pastors. They have received one in house nomination for a call. Report was accepted by unanimous consent.

Trustee's Report: Joe Curry presented a report outlining work that has been done. All 5 furnaces are working well and have all been replaced. The plexiglass project and the ceiling in the All Saints addition have not been completed and are open for discussion. Snowblower is ready to be used if needed and Springfield Gutter Company will continue to remove snow for 2024. The parsonage house will be addressed once Pastor Pritchard has moved out, which is planned for next week. Report was accepted by unanimous consent.

Education/Stewardship Report: Lindsey Van Zele was absent from the meeting.

Church Council Report: Gary Klekamp reported the Church Council met November 30, 2023. After hearing all reports from Boards and Pastor, items discussed were as follows;

- 1. Due to the challenge of finding people to fill Officer positions at Zion, a change in the elected 2024 Officers is necessary and needs to be ratified by Zions Voting Assembly which is scheduled for this meeting.
- 2. A resolution from Lutheran High School was read which stated, as an association congregation, Zion Lutheran Church will pledge Spiritual, verbal, and financial support for the rebuilding of Lutheran High School at a new location with all the facilities necessary to fulfill its mission.
- It was noted that Zion Lutheran Church will continue its support as it has in the past.
- 3. With the change of Zions Chairman of the Congregation from Gary Klekamp to Eric Oschwald, Minutes of the November Church Council Meeting were submitted to Illinois National Bank in Pleasant Plains to allow the change of names on all bank accounts to take effect January 1, 2024.
- 4. Due to the increase in cost, Church Council made the decision to close the Safety Deposit Box at INB in Pleasant Plains and place all the necessary documents in the fire proof filing cabinet in the church office.
- 5. Church Council approved the Glenn Oschwald Parochial Education Fund Operating Agreement and Investment Policy, presented by Eric Oschwald.

Church Council met December 10, 2023 with a Special Meeting. Items discussed were as follows:

Vacancy Pastor for 2024, Salary Guidelines and Church Service Times.

After much discussion, in the end, at the request of Board of Elders, Church Council approved Pastor Jeff Gross from Bethlehem Lutheran Church in Petersburg as Vacancy Pastor. Salary guidelines include \$300 plus mileage per Service performed. The start time of our Church Service will be 8:30 am each Sunday morning; with Adult Bible Study and Children's Sunday School starts at 9:45am.

Church Council did not meet at the next regularly scheduled date of December 28, 2023 due to the Christmas season and end of the year. Report was accepted by unanimous consent.

Pastor's Report: No Report

Stewardship/Outreach Report:

Stephanie Goebel reported they have not met this year. Pastor Pritchard's Retirement Dinner was a success. Their next meeting they would like to meet with Pastor Gross to discuss different projects. Report was accepted by unanimous consent.

Unfinished Business: Gary Klekamp noted that the officers elected in October need to be ratified with Eric Oschwald and Nathan VanZele. Motion by Mary Curry and seconded by Sue Matzat to approve Nathan VanZele serving a one year term as Financial Secretary to finish Eric's term, MCVV.

Gary Klekamp handed the meeting over to Eric Oschwald, the newly elected Chairman.

New Business: Eris Oschwald thanked those members who stayed to attend the Voter's Meeting after church. He also thanked Gary Klekamp for his years of service as Chairman to the congregation. There have been many issues, including Covid, that he worked through and made the Congregation and the Church better.

Eric Oschwald brought up the idea of renting out the parsonage once the punch list is completed. Discussion was held concerning different aspects of renting.

Motion by Brad Mahler and seconded by Frank Wallace to donate the laptop to Pastor Pritchard that he was using while at Zion, discussion held, MCVV.

Motion by Brad Mahler and seconded by Frank Wallace to adjourn the meeting. Meeting was closed with the Lord's Prayer.
