Zion Lutheran Church Church Council Minutes - Draft August 31, 2023

Gary Klekamp called the meeting to order at 6:35 P.M. Present were Gary Klekamp, Pastor Pritchard, Lindsay Van Zele, Joe Curry, Eric Oschwald and David Manuel. Absent: Dennis Boesdorfer and Stacy Stremsterfer. Visitor present – Sue Matzat. Gary explained that Sue was present as temporary secretary in Stacy's absence.

Pastor opened with a reading from Pastor Harrison's book "Take Courage – Encouraging Words for Discouraging Times" and prayer.

Minutes from the May 25, 2023 (last Council meeting), were presented. Minutes were accepted as presented.

The **Treasurer's Report** was presented. Reports indicated that the account balance in the General Fund is \$205.25 with approximately \$2,522.20 in upcoming bills. After discussion, David Manuel moved to table further deficit resolution discussions until after the Trustee's report. Lindsay Van Zele seconded. Motion passed. Treasurer's Report was accepted by unanimous decision.

The **Financial Secretary's** Report was presented by Eric Oschwald. Eric's report showed that offerings were lagging behind from this point in prior years. He commented that several of our "Legacy" givers had passed, which is resulting in an approximate shortage of \$20,000 a year. Financial Secretary's Report was accepted by unanimous decision.

Elders Report – Dennis submitted the following report to Gary, who presented it to Council. The Elders met on August 10. The following were discussed – Confirmation Classes this fall with 3 eligible students; a mentoring program for the younger people in our congregation to assist with the church services such as acolyting and collection of the offering; responses to the delinquent member letters and the dedication of the new electronic sign to be held on August 20. Pastor suggested that the Advent services be held at noon with lunch to follow. Elders agreed with time change. Dennis announced to the Elders that he was resigning from the Board of Elders at this time.

Council members discussed the proposed change of time to the Advent services. Majority were not in favor of the change, but would like input from the Voter's Assembly and congregation. Gary asked Sue to publish notices in the October newsletter and bulletins that times of the Advent services will be discussed at the Fall Quarterly Voter's Meeting and that opinions were welcome.

Church Council wanted to acknowledge the service Dennis has done as Head Elder and expressed their appreciation. Elder's Report was accepted as presented.

Trustees Report – Joe Curry presented a report on the bid for updating the sound system. Bill Schnake gave 2 bids – one an analog system, the other a digital system. Joe's report gave the strengths of both systems and the costs. Joe then presented a bid from BVB Glass to replace the plexiglass covering on the front stained glass windows in the Sanctuary. After discussion, Joe will go back to BVB Glass for additional information and options. The Trustees are recommending putting both projects on hold at this time. Church Council members agreed with recommendation. David Manual made a motion to put a pause on both projects, Lindsay Van Zele seconded. Motion carried.

Following the installation and payment for the landscaping around the new electronic sign, the funds in Glenn Brandt's memorial account are now past the 2 year holding period. With no other project planned for those funds, motion made by David Manuel and seconded by Lindsay Van Zele to transfer the remaining funds in Glenn Brandt's memorial account to the Building Fund per current policy. Motion carried.

Pastor asked Joe about removing the piles of branches around the property from the June storms. Joe said he would take care of it.

Trustees Report accepted by unanimous consent.

Board of Education – Lindsay Van Zele reported that Sunday School was resuming on September 3. A rotating staff of teachers will conduct the classes. Board of Education report accepted by unanimous consent.

Pastor's Report – Pastor reported Baptized -196, Communicant – 159, Average Attendance YTD – 47, Average Communed – 43. He has prepped for the Divine Services and Bible Studies. Home communions, hospital and nursing home visits as usual. He has attended meetings as needed, ISP and ILFOP Chaplain duties as usual, attended the state fair and made numerous Parish phone contacts. Pastor's report accepted by unanimous consent.

Stewardship & Outreach Committee – Pastor reported that the "Teacher's Welcome Back" donuts were appreciated by the teachers on their first day of classes. Thrivent Action Team grants are being used to fund their projects. Stewardship & Outreach Report accepted by unanimous consent.

Unfinished Business: None

New Business:

Eric Oschwald reported that the Glenn Oschwald Parochial Educational Scholarship committee is recommending that Mackenzie Matzat be awarded a scholarship for her tuition at Trinity Lutheran School for the 2023-2024 academic year. Scholarship to be presented to Mackenzie following the Divine Service in a few weeks. Recommendation approved.


Church Council discussed how to address the deficit in the General Fund. There was some question whether members understood how their offerings were allocated if it wasn't designated on their offering envelopes. Eric will work on preparing a bulletin announcement explaining how the undesignated funds are allocated (90% General Fund, 10% Missions).

Stacy Stremsterfer entered the meeting. Discussion was held regarding borrowing funds from the Building Fund to cover immediate expenses paid from the General Fund. Motion made by Eric Oschwald to approve the transfer of funds from the Building Fund to the General Fund not to exceed \$7500, with an initial transfer of \$5000. Borrowed funds to be repaid within 12 months. Stacy seconded motion. Motion passed with 1 abstaining.

Motion to adjourn.

Let's Be Clear

Our lack of clarity about the meaning and intentions of Islam is due to our lack of clarity about the meaning of Christianity. The western world has assumed that Islam and Christianity are just species of the same genus, that is, as though they both can be placed together under the title: "religion." In this thinking, both Islam and Christianity are merely "religion." Religion encompasses all vaguely moral behavior and relegates to the outer fringes all talk of supernatural divine revelation as unverifiable. At most, therefore, religion becomes a moral pumpkin seed spitting contest to see which "religion" has the most fanatically devoted followers or has inspired the most deeply sacrificial efforts on the part of its co-religionists. By such standards perhaps we should become followers of Muhammad. Islam is replete with martyrs, sent to slaughter infidels, sacrificed in the name of Allah. Islam even pays some lip service

me. If another comes in his own name, you will receive him.


How can you believe, when you receive glory from one another and do not seek the glory that comes from the only God? Do not think that I will accuse you to the Father. There is one who accuses you: Moses, on whom you have set your hope. If you believed Moses. you would believe me; for he wrote of me. But if you do not believe his writings, how will you believe my words?" (ESV)

to Jesus as a prophet, even if He is superseded by Muhammad.

But biblical Christianity does not claim to be a mere religion led by a prophet. It is not primarily an ethical code, no matter how holy or elevated that code might be. Christianity is about Christ, who is not merely a prophet, but the God-Man. Christianity consists of Christ, the Son of God. Without Christ, His life, His death, His resurrection, His ascension, and His return to rescue us, there is no Church and no Christianity. And while ethics is important within its own sphere, it does not define Christianity, nor differentiate Christianity from mere religion. Our lack of clarity about Christianity's essence makes us blind to the vast differences between Christianity and Islam. If we do not know and confess the centrality of the person of the Son of God to our faith, we will never recognize what is inferior about Islam, and indeed every other mere "religion."

Christianity stands or falls on the contention that Christ, the eternal Son of the Father, true God and true Man, is the final and complete revelation of God in the world. Christianity stands or falls on the contention that this One divine and human person is the payment for the sin of the world by His death and life. Christianity stands or falls on the vicarious satisfaction of the eternal Son for us sinners. If that is not so, if these supernatural contentions about the person of Christ are only the superstitious and partly loopy beliefs of a mere fringe of the Christian faith, then we have every reason to accept as equally valid the moral teachings of Islam and its prophet Muhammad. But if it is true that Christ, God's Son, is the only way to our heavenly Father, then we have no reason to give any quarter to the religion of Muhammad. Let's be clear about that.

"The outward life of the [Islamic] Turks is said to be marked by an appearance of piety. They pray, fast, give alms, establish charitable institutions, and build churches [mosques]. They are ready to help others. And with this appearance of holiness they deceive many people. Thus the pope also duped us. At the time we did not know better, but we believed that monastic orders and monkeries were the proper and correct way to heaven. Anyone who is not well armed with this article of faith and has not pressed it deep into his heart falls easy prey to the shining external shimmer of holiness as well as to the prominent names of prophets and teachers.

"But because they have devised such a variety of ways to heaven, we will tell them: 'We will stick to the one way to heaven and adhere to Him who descended and simultaneously remained above.' He is our sole resurrection, as is said in John: 'I am the resurrection, and the truth, and the life.' Therefore He is the only way to heaven, since He alone ascended there. Whoever remains loyal to this article of faith also remains loyal to Christ. Even if he were led captive to Turkey and were an eyewitness of the practice of the Turkish religion [of Islam], of their many fasts and prayers, he would still say: 'All this fails to interest me. Even if the pope and the Turk were to raise the dead, even if they flogged themselves with rods till the blood streamed from them, even if they fasted several weeks on bread and water, I know, despite all this, that you are not the resurrection

or the life or the way to heaven. You will not deceive and delude me with all these acts. For Christ alone is the way, and no other.'

"If a Christian preserves this article of faith in its truth and purity, it will be easy for him to ward off all false teachers and deceivers as well as his own whims and notions. Yes, he who holds fast to this has a mainstay for life; and he will also be saved in death through this one faith in Christ, that is, if he believes that Christ alone ascended into heaven. Therefore, he will not be lost."
